

FROM THE COMMANDING OFFICER

RICKOVER has had a busy underway in August and September. We were mostly focused on doing developmental exercises to test new technology and tactics to make the submarine force more stealthy and more effective at tracking other subs. However, we did take a few breaks from our science missions.

First, we did two days of underway filming with a helicopter for the next Mission Impossible movie, ending time at periscope depth with a rising emergency blow to the surface. I haven't seen the footage yet, but I'm looking forward to seeing the movie in May 2025 to see how we jumped out of the water. Second, we did a distinguished visitor cruise with some Congressional aides out of Port Canaveral, Florida. Our submarine force brings a lot of capabilities to our national defense, and it's important for us to explain what we do to Congress because they are ultimately the ones who set policies and provide funding for the submarine force and our families.

Finally, we got to take a break from testing in the Bahamas for a swim call over the side in the Bahamas. Lots of guys really just wanted "cell phone liberty" to check in with the world and call their friends and families, but we also had a great day for sun and swimming.

We're doing some maintenance and training right now in port and will be back out to sea soon for most of the next few months. We're doing some high-end combat simulations to train ourselves and develop new tactics. We also have another developmental exercise to keep working on next-generation technology. Naturally, we are also putting a lot of effort into engineering readiness while we're out. Early next year, we're planning a return trip to our builders at Electric Boat to get some warranty maintenance done. There are a few outstanding material problems from the build process that the shipyard is going to fix. Naturally, the Navy is also looking to add a few upgrades to make our systems safer and more effective.

I've spent a lot of time talking about my three goals for the ship over the next six months. First, we are trying to be ready for combat as a ship and as individuals. We are a warship first and foremost, and even after we start our maintenance period at Electric Boat next year many RICKOVER sailors will get called to help out on other, operational ships. Second, we have to be ready for our maintenance availabilities. Our ship is too capable and too valuable to not show up ready to get work done safely the first time. Third, I want the crew to stay focused on getting ready for our maiden deployment overseas in 2026. While it seems like it's a long way away, the experience and qualifications we can get now will help prepare the current generation of junior sailors to be the leaders of their divisions and watch teams when we get out there for our first overseas deployment.



Can you think of a symbol that has immediate meaning to you? Maybe it's the American flag, the logo of your favorite sports team, or your college mascot. For the men and women of the Submarine Force, it's the submarine warfare insignia, informally known as a submariner's "dolphins." Submariners earn their dolphins by demonstrating their vast knowledge of all the systems aboard their submarine in a process they call "qualifying." Qualifying is not just a rite of passage or an achievement for submariners, it is a requirement of submarine service. A new unqualified submariner has a year to successfully complete the qualification process and pass his or her final evaluation board prior to receiving their dolphins.

OMBUDSMAN UPDATE

As always, I would be remiss if I didn't remind everyone of proper Operations Security (OPSEC). One of the most critical roles of a military family is to keep the information your service member gives you secure. This information could be about boat movement, port calls, the maintenance schedule, or upcoming missions. Keeping the information safe includes not sharing it in writing (including text messages), in public places, or on any social media platforms like Reddit, TikTok, and Facebook. I speak of OPSEC often because we never know when our sailors are going to be called away for a mission, and therefore we should be practicing it constantly.
